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Gateway involved in national

adult career pathways test study

KENOSHA – Gateway Technical College is one of six technical colleges

involved in a national study which will work to identify, enroll, educate and

prepare underemployed adults for high-demand careers.

The effort will bring together manufacturing and logistics groups to

determine the skills needed for their industry and how technical colleges can

offer career pathways to adult students leading to jobs within those areas.

Despite efforts by technical colleges and others to train skilled workers, national

studies indicate that a lack of a skilled workforce is still the major challenge in

nearly every industry and state.

Selected business owners in the Gateway Technical College District area

have been asked to attend a July 17 summit with the Clements Group to discuss

the disconnect between the need and availability of adult workers. Many adult

workers don't see that connection - or career pathway - between technical

college and good-paying jobs.

This summit will help to address that disconnect. Gateway will partner with

the Center for Occupational Research and Development (CORD) along with the

five other colleges and industry leaders to implement Adult Career Pathways.

This program focuses on helping bring skilled workers to the labor pool by connecting them with the career pathways at a technical college.

The premise of adult pathways is to take underemployed workers – some who work three jobs to make ends meet – and train them to be able to land a skilled job of quality employment. Workers benefit by entering a solid career field and industry benefits by having more skilled workers.

These workers are typically older than the traditional high school graduate and may have completed some college work, or even graduated, before they entered the workforce.

After the July 17 summit, college officials will compile the recommendations and develop ways to reconnect the adult worker with a clear understanding of the skilled careers open to them through technical college training.

Gateway was selected as one of the colleges for the program because it has several of the adult pathway theories in place already, and has shown leadership in new and efficient workforce and economic development strategies.

The program will be implemented in three stages:

- A manufacturing and industry summit will be held and benchmarks set.
- Local and regional dialogue to define local needs and build partnerships.
- Implementation of the Adult Career Pathways program.
