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**Gateway president invited
to speak about Gateway's international training**

Gateway Technical College President Bryan Albrecht was an invited speaker Monday at the 35th Annual Community Colleges for International Development (CCID) conference.

The topic of his presentation was the role Gateway has played to develop an automotive diagnostics training program for the college of Ecole Superieure de Technologie in Morocco. Gateway, in partnership with Snap-on Tools, Seattle Community College and Francis Tuttle Career Center in Okla., has been developing an automotive diagnostics training program for the Moroccan college.

"This opportunity places Gateway and the NC3 partners as a leader in workforce training throughout the world," said Albrecht. "I'm pleased and honored to continue to talk about the Gateway story and the need to provide opportunities for international partnerships through higher education."

The CCID conference held in Orlando, Fla., drew participants from 15 countries. CID is the organization recognized by the Association for Global Education as the leader in international partnerships for students.

Gateway was recently awarded a second Higher Education Development grant to expand its work in Morocco focusing on entrepreneurial education.

CCID's stated mission is to "provide opportunities for building global relationships that strengthen educational programs, and promote economic development."
