MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Gateway provides great return on investment

Gateway Technical College provides a great return on investment for its students through strong curriculum, quality instruction and area workforce partners who bring their expertise, knowledge and resources to benefit students at the college.

As we look at the work of the college in the past year, a few thoughts come to the forefront. The first is that after 106 years of service, Gateway continues to provide a great return on investment for its students. A recent survey shows Gateway students will see a \$7.50 in higher future income for every \$1 they invest in their education. Our most recent graduate survey indicates that 87 percent of our recent graduates are employed within 6 months of graduation with an average wage of \$17.93 an hour.

Our strong partnerships with area businesses help us create a real-world curriculum using equipment seen in industry today – our graduates are work-ready and will strengthen the area workforce.

One example is the Reader Precision Manufacturing Center on our Elkhorn Campus, named after the Reader family, founder and owner of the Elkhorn-based Precision Plus. The center is a place where students can learn the skills for a solid career and a place of innovation for students and industry.

Another example is our partnership with Kenall Manufacturing. We've partnered with Kenall leaders to create tailored instruction to meet their training needs at their Kenosha facility. Kenall believes strongly in the value Gateway brings to their business and the community. In addition, Kenall donated \$250,000 to Gateway's tuition-free college program. We've also named our new law enforcement center the Kenall Protective Services Training Center.

A final important thought is that we serve our communities in a number of ways. There are examples of the impact the college has on Southeastern Wisconsin throughout this year's annual report, and I would encourage you to seek them out and read more. We are proud of our connections and the many ways we positively impact our communities.

We are here to serve our students, our businesses and our communities.

This year, the college rolled out its Gateway Promise program, which helps ensure tuition-free college for qualifying students seeking an education.

With generous community support through donations to the Gateway Technical College Foundation, the Gateway Promise ensures Kenosha County, Racine County and Walworth County high school graduates, who meet program eligibility requirements, can attend Gateway tuition-free. The first eligible class is the high school graduating class of 2017, and many students applied prior to the February 1 deadline. GREEN & SUSTAINABLE

Committed environmental stewardship

One of Gateway's core values is its commitment to sustainability.

In the past year, the college has shown

its commitment to being green in a number of ways. The college reduced its carbon footprint through installing a number of wind and solar energy systems, buying renewable power and offering commuting alternatives.

In October 2015, Gateway Technical College President and CEO, Bryan Albrecht signed Second Nature's new Climate Leadership Commitment, making public the college's commitment to remain "green" and sustainable in its operations and provide education and training for emerging green industry careers.

In November 2015, president Albrecht also signed on to the American Campus Act on Climate Pledge to demonstrate the college's support for strong climate action by world leaders.



This arboretum, developed in 2015-16 next to the Pike Creek Horticulture Center in Kenosha, now includes 54 trees. Plants and trees are selected by professional horticulturists.

Quick "green" hits highlighting Gateway sustainable efforts:

- Celebrate Earth Day events on the Kenosha Campus and Elkhorn Campus, as well as the inaugural EcoFest on the Racine Campus, attended by thousands, provided hands-on activities and demonstrations to be better environmental stewards in our community and life.

- A weekly farmer's market is held on the Kenosha campus







Work with troubled youth to help them turn their lives around.


Reaching that goal...

Ray Moore had held jobs over the years at area companies, going from one to the next when he was laid off as businesses closed down or moved overseas. Then he chose to come back to school.

Three and a half decades after graduating from high school, Ray started his career at Gateway and was helped by its many resources – Learning Success programs, tutoring services as well as two Gateway Technical College Foundation Scholarships. Ray developed as a student, eventually earning his degree, several industry certifications and speaking for the Foundation at a collegewide event.

BUSINESS & WORKFORCE SOLUTIONS

Gateway's Business and Workforce Solutions (BWS) continued its innovative and solid skills training this year, providing a way for businesses to increase their bottom line through better trained staff – and those workers a way to increase their skills and meet career goals. "With an improved economy we are situated to provide more customized and short-term training to those who have acquired a job but need additional skill training," says Debbie Davidson, Vice President-Business and Workforce Solutions.

Davidson points out that a restructuring effort and the appointment of a director of operations, a director of programming and director of business development allowed the department to align itself more closely with national best practices.

Apprenticeship enrollment continued to grow to more than 300 apprentices through the addition of new company-sponsored apprenticeships and new apprentice program offerings such as Wastewater Treatment Operator, and program expansion in the Tech Plumbing and Construction Electrical programs.

Boot Camps included three computer numerical control (CNC) boot camps, two high school CNC boot camps, three logistics boot camps and one telecom/cable installer boot camp.

The Launch Box co-working space moved from Main Street in Racine to the Gateway Racine Campus. This new space includes two private conference rooms, video conferencing equipment and access to all the resources at the campus. This allows for better engagement between entrepreneurs and Gateway students in the BIZ Squad. It also provides a place for Gateway students to test their own business ideas.

The Fab Lab, located at Gateway's SC Johnson integrated Manufacturing and Engineering Technology Center, provides 3D printing and other innovative prototyping equipment access to students and the community. It is part of the U.S. Fab Lab Network.

Business & Workforce Solutions continued to work with local employers to submit Workforce Advancement Training grants in partnership with local businesses.





Pharmacy Technician

Pharmacy industry expert prescribes Gateway to address job openings



Donna Janas-Foreman's prescription to address the many open pharmacy technician openings in Southeastern Wisconsin? Quality training, producing career-ready applicants qualified to work in a retail or hospital setting and able to achieve national certification.

The director of pharmacy at Aurora Medical Center-Kenosha says that training is being provided right now at Gateway Technical College through its Pharmacy Technician program. "There is a great need for pharmacy technicians and not enough qualified candidates," says Janas-Foreman. "People think that they are just glorified cashiers. They aren't. Pharmacy technicians are the backbone of retail and hospital pharmacy operations".

"They have a lot of responsibility placed upon them. That's where the training comes in, that's what's needed."

Janas-Foreman has worked for many years in the pharmacy industry – her first 16 as a pharmacy tech herself – and has that unique insight only a veteran of the business can possess. "Gateway has listened to its advisory board and the industry. The program has been tailored to prepare students in the skills they will need in the workforce."

DECA students take first place at state and nationals

Two students from Gateway Collegiate DECA captured first-place honors – and 12 took second place or third place – at the 54th Wisconsin Collegiate DECA annual Spring Competitive Events Conference held March 3 to March 6, 2016 in Madison.

Students also took first place as a group, as well. Gateway student Violeta Tellez took third place in the Entrepreneurship-Starting a Business event nationals at Washington D.C. Several other students placed in the top 10 of their categories.

Rodriguez-Gonzalez named as Star Ambassador

Ivan Rodriguez-Gonzalez was named Gateway Technical College's District Star Ambassador at the Ambassador Awards ceremony held March 3, 2016.

Rodriguez-Gonzalez was selected as Kenosha Campus Star Ambassador. He represents the Gateway student body at local and national events.

Welding student captures honors

Gateway Technical College welding student Tom Ruge captured second place out of 200 contestants in the "Best Welder in America" competition at FABTECH 2015 held in Chicago in December 2015.

Ruge took second place in the event which required contestants to make a gas metal arc weld in fewer than 5 minutes on low-carbon steel, and were graded on speed and quality.

Floral design student competes against pros

Gateway floral design student Heather Rupp competed against professionals in a nationwide floral design event held in California and took third place.

Rupp was the only student to compete in the professionals division in the Floral Design Centerpiece Challenge portion of the competition.

SUMMER CAMPS.

Gateway offers a number of camps to dozens of youth in its communities, providing a way to have fun and learn some valuable skills over a number of its academic areas. It also offers MakerGirls camps which specifically offered a way for pre-teen girls to learn 3D and other engineering skills, as well as "green" camps which introduce middle schoolaged youth to sustainable concepts through hands-on projects.



VOLUNTARY HEALTH CARE.

Students in several of Gateway's health occupations courses provided free health care and health care prevention services at two large clinic events held during the year. The annual Boys and Girls Club Health and Wellness Fair provides services and education to youth, while a communitywide health fair in Kenosha provides services to the public.

National Fiat Chrysler technician rollout begins at Gateway

Fiat Chrysler Automobiles (FCA LLC) announced its intention to partner with Gateway's automotive technician program to provide students with the training to be certified as Mopar Level 1 technicians. Gateway is the first college in the nation to engage in the training which will be embedded in its two-year Automotive Technician associate degree program.

New effort helps veterans gain credit for learning, skills from military

Gateway began a program to provide military veterans with even more credit toward earning a health care degree for their work and training while in the service. Through federal grant funding, the college began offering military skills assessment opportunities for those who have military occupation specialties in the related fields of dental assisting, surgical technology, physical therapist technician, corpsman or medic.

Gateway receives grant to extend successful TRiO program

Gateway received a federal grant to continue its TRiO Student Support Services program, an effort that assists colleges offering programming to low-income and students with disabilities and those who are the first in their families to attend college. The U.S. Department of Education, funded through the TRiO Student Support Services grant, awarded Gateway 100 percent of project funding.

White House names Gateway **Bright Spot for educational** excellence for Hispanics

Gateway was honored as one of more than 230 Bright Spots in Hispanic Education for its commitment to improving the educational attainment of Hispanics. Alejandra Ceja, executive director of the White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanics, made the announcement at the launch of Hispanic Heritage Month and in honor of the initiative's 25th anniversary in Washington D.C.

Gateway part of effort to support expansion of sexual assault, domestic violence prevention programs

Gateway Technical College, along with several other community partners, received more than \$400,000 to support sexual assault and domestic violence prevention and treatment programs in southeastern Wisconsin. It was part of a Milwaukee - Aurora Health Care grant award through its Better Together Fund.

Gateway president honored nationally as Entrepreneurial President

The National Association for Community College Entrepreneurship (NACCE) named Gateway President and CEO Bryan Albrecht as the 2015 Entrepreneurial President, an award which recognizes a college president nationally for "entrepreneurial mindset in building an entrepreneurial spirit throughout internal and external campus communities." Gateway host site for another innovation conference

The conference, "Gateway to Innovation," drew instructors from across the Midwest and featured workshops on technical education.

Transfer agreement means more options for Nursing, Human Services graduates

Gateway and George Williams College of Aurora University (GWC), located in Williams Bay, signed two transfer agreements, giving students in nursing and human services expanded educational and career opportunities. The agreement provides a seamless opportunity for Gateway graduates to continue their education and complete a bachelor's degree in human services and nursing science from GWC.



SC Johnson renews donation to Gateway Technical College Boot Camp program

Gateway Foundation announced a \$1.5 million grant from SC Johnson to underwrite the continuation of the Gateway to Careers Boot Camp program over the next three years. In 2012, SC Johnson made an initial investment of \$1.7 million to advance the existing Boot Camp training program and fund Gateway's expanded, state-of-the-art SC Johnson integrated Manufacturing and Engineering Technology Center in Sturtevant.

What is Step UP?

Gateway's Step UP program provides direct assistance to students who are on their way to becoming self-sufficient by reducing the barriers to employment and aiding students in obtaining marketable career skills and secure employment. It is open to individuals, male or female, who have worked in their homes for a number of years providing unpaid household support for family members and meet other criteria. The program provides many ways to help them earn their degree or diploma and then a position in their field of study.



Students gain experience and businesses access to services through BIZ Squad

Through Gateway's BIZ Squad, students gain hands-on experience while providing no-cost, customized assistance to companies in Southeastern Wisconsin. Dozens of businesses have benefited from the program and hundreds of students have applied the skills they've learned in the classroom to real-world projects.

"Students from various degree programs bring their expertise to this experience – where they immediately take the role of project managers," says Laura Laznicka, Graphic Communications instructor. HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TAKE GATEWAY CLASSES.



STRIVE. To meet the growing demand for postsecondary education, Gateway has partnered with Carthage College and UW-Parkside to collaborate with workforce and business development partners in southeastern Wisconsin to help achieve higher levels of adult degree completion by reducing barriers to education for adult learners in our communities.



STUDY:

Gateway prepares its graduates well for the workforce

The most recent graduate numbers show that Gateway graduates successfully enter the workforce and their career and are pleased with the education they received.

The 2015 Graduate Follow-Up Survey shows that 87 percent of the 1,522 associate degree and technical diploma graduates responding to the survey landed a job within six months of graduation, and 69 percent in their field of study.

The average full-time wage for these graduates is \$17.93 per hour, topping out at \$40.87 per hour. Of those not in the workforce, 88 percent indicated that the reason was because they were continuing their education.

A total of 98 percent of those responding were satisfied with their Gateway training. The survey further showed 73 percent of Gateway graduates remain in the college's district which encompasses Racine County, Kenosha County and Walworth County, and 20 percent live and work outside the district but still in Wisconsin.

A total of 48 percent said they attended to prepare for a career, 31 percent to continue their education, 12 percent were seeking a career change and 5 percent were seeking to increase their job skills.

COMPUTER CLINICS.

It was during the tough times that Cina turned to a part-time job working with a patient in a physical therapy setting to help bring in extra money and then turned to Gateway to make it a full-time career.


