

PRESIDENT'S REPORT MARCH 2025

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS (Matt Janisin)

Academic Operations

Academic Operations is responsible for building and producing the course section offerings for the district for each academic term. For the 25/26 academic year, this included 7102 course deliveries and 1310 conflict free academic blocks. These course section offerings for SU25, FA25, and SP26 were imported to our students information system and self service on 2/28/25. This will support student advising, which began on 3/3/25 and registration which begins on 3/17/25. In continued effort to better align the number of sections needed with our student enrollment trends, some sections have been placed in pending status. This should help reduce the number of sections canceled and reduce the number of empty seats in sections. Pending sections will be made active if enrollment warrants.

Meeting and event scheduling continues to be very busy and active, with over 150 external requests to use Gateway space during the past 2 months.

Academic Operations has selected Bibliu as the Bookstore vendor beginning 7/1/25. With this partnership an equitable access program will be rolled out in 25/26 to reduce the cost of textbooks for students.

Elkhorn Campus

Dr. Amy Hankins presented as a panelist at the LID in-service at Haribo Hall on January 24, discussing the evolving role of Al in education. She explored Al's applications, broader impact, and challenges, along with key considerations for educators. Dr. Hankins shared strategies for integrating Al into teaching, including assignments where students used Al for research and creative writing. The session offered practical advice for leveraging Al in careers and



classrooms, and highlighted its current use at Gateway.



Elkhorn Students enjoyed doughnuts, coffee, and conversation with our School of Health deans who were on campus welcoming our students.

Kenosha Campus

The Kenosha Campus hosted several great Gateway events during the month of February, including the Campus Ambassador Awards, State of the College, African American Youth Empowerment Conference, Primary Polling location for Kenosha residents, and the Gateway Foundation Scholarship Awards.

Rehab construction of faculty office space located in the Academic Building, T108, has been completed and faculty are moved back in. Contracts are being submitted for the Tech AHU replacement and the Inspire RHU replacement. The Tech Building Corridor upgrade, Academic Building Chiller replacement are in the design phase.

Racine Campus

Racine Campus Ambassador Judging took place on 2/6/25. Anahi Herrara (Liberal Arts-Associate of Arts - AAS was selected to represent the Racine Campus.

The Racine Campus hosted the MOC Scholars Leadership Summit on 2/12/25. Despite the Winter Weather, our students had the opportunity to engage with community leaders such as the City of Racine, Chief of Police, Alex Ramirez.

Burlington Center

HazMat Technician is taking place this semester at Somers Fire department. The course is being taught by Gavin DeGrave, Aaron Strom, and Bryan Phillips. HazMat Tech provides a deeper dive into HazMat operations - (HazMat Ops is a requirement for Wisconsin FFI Certification). HazMat technicians aka hazardous materials technicians, are trained responders to identify, handle, store, and dispose of substances that pose a risk to human health, wildlife, and or the environment, while using specialized protective clothing equipment.

iMET Center

The iMET Center was filled with a multitude of activities and events for the month of February. We hosted the SkillsUSA event consisting of various high school students from our tricounty areas showcasing their skills in the areas of STEM and career education.





Also, we were able to celebrate the first graduate of the CNC Uniquely Abled program through Gateway's Business and Workforce Solutions Department.



Additionally, the iMET Center held the STEM Expo for multiple high school students from the tri-county area exposing them to Gateway's manufacturing, engineering, and apprenticeship programs. There were many manufacturing and engineering companies that attended and participated in the event as well.

The Boys Scouts of America held its annual merit badge competition at the iMET Center, whereas multiple Gateway instructors, staff members and administrators volunteered their time to make this event a success. We had 147 scouts across the various programs at four Gateway campuses and centers. Up 28% from last year.



Horizon Center

School of Pre-College and Momentum Programs

Students from one of our ABE Communication classes had the opportunity to work in the FAB Lab at the IMET Center. Here is Gabriela Anaya, ABE Instructor shared:

What we did...

- John walked us through the Fab Lab's five primary technologies. Students enjoyed learning/practicing in each area.
- Students designed their own tumblers--mementos for their upcoming graduation. They included graduation date, GTC logo, favorite proverb, etc.
- Students reflected & brainstormed the technologies that they learned about (3D, Laser, VR). They developed a collaborative presentation based on their experiences. Please note that I asked students ahead of time if they were comfortable having their pictures taken, sharing the presentation, etc.

School of Health

Our Associate Dean Renee Seymour and a number of faculty took a bus full of nursing students to Madison to take part in Nurses Day at the Capital. It was an all-day event that included a meeting with a legislator.



Elkhorn Health Wing Open House will take place on Thursday March 6, 2025. We will host multiple high schools in the morning and there will also be a session in the afternoon for the college and community.

The nursing program is taking another group of students to work with a disaster relief organization. Twenty faculty and students will be traveling to western North Carolina April 21-25 to participate in a home rebuild for a family who lost everything in the fall hurricane and subsequent flooding. This is the same organization that we partnered with in November when we took a group of 13 to Valdosta, Georgia to help with the cleanup there!

High School Partnerships

The High School Partnerships team hosted a Dual Credit Information Session on February 4th, sharing the benefits of earning college credit in high school and guidance on program applications. The team also attended the DWD Apprenticeship Conference with seven high school partners to explore workforce trends and strengthen career-focused pathways. Another key accomplishment was launching spring transcripted credit registration, ensuring students are enrolled in college-level courses. HS Partnerships continues collaborating with local schools to expand opportunities for academic and career success.

Program Effectiveness

In preparation for the 2025-26 academic year, the program effectiveness team produced 184 curriculum sheets documenting requirements for the college's academic degree, diploma, apprenticeship, and certificate programs. In addition to designing the outward-facing curriculum documentation, the team updated all necessary elements within the WTCS Portal to ensure program requirements and courses received approval from education directors before being offered to students. All curriculum sheets will be released to the college in early March.

College Excellence

The Institutional Research office recently submitted the 2024 Graduate Outcomes survey results to the state, with a strong 68% response rate (1,419 responses). Similar to previous years, 95% of graduates report satisfaction with their education, and 89% of those in the labor force are employed. However, only 67% are working in a field related to their degree. Among full-time graduates employed in a related field, they report a median salary of \$62,000. Additionally, 70% of employed graduates (for whom we know the location) work within our tri-county district, reinforcing Gateway's role in supporting the local workforce. More detailed results will be available on the Gateway website soon.

Business and Workforce Solutions

Gateway's Business & Workforce Solutions team is proud to announce the successful completion of the first student in the Uniquely Abled CNC Program. After 16 weeks of intensive CNC training, including two Workforce Readiness courses and numerous industry-recognized certifications, the student earned their CNC Advanced Operator Certificate, marking a significant milestone for the program.

On February 19, a Completion Ceremony was held in iMET's Tarnowski Hall, where instructors, staff, family, and friends gathered to celebrate this achievement. The Uniquely Abled Academy is a specialized initiative designed to provide young adults diagnosed with level one autism the opportunity to develop industry-specific skills. Through this program, participants receive comprehensive training to earn a CNC Advanced Operator Certificate, preparing them for rewarding careers in precision manufacturing.

This marks the first of three cohorts in Gateway's Uniquely Abled Academy CNC Career Pathway Grant training. While the first student successfully completed training in

February, a second cohort is currently underway at the SC Johnson iMET Center, and a third is in progress at the Elkhorn Campus. Both are scheduled to conclude in late June.

The following are highlighted activities from the Support Specialists since the beginning of the spring semester:

- The Multicultural Program continues to support English Language Learner students by piloting conversation labs for the spring semester.
 - ELL students can practice speaking and listening skills gained in class with peers and staff in these labs, available on Friday mornings and afternoons.

- Students can virtually participate in one-on-one, small-group, and largegroup discussions.
- The Multicultural Program has also been active in the campus community this spring, participating on numerous committees across the college, including Women in Manufacturing, Women's History Month, Transfer Fair, and Black History Month.
- On January 22nd, the Multicultural Program hosted a visit from UW-Parkside's Office of Multicultural Student Affairs (OMSA) on the Kenosha campus.

Foundation

- **Direct Aid to Students**: A total of 28 students have received emergency grant assistance. Twenty-one received \$16,510 from Foundation funds. Seven students received \$6,345 from the WTCS Grant. The High School Scholarship application is open until April 5, 2025.
- The Foundation Scholarship Awards Ceremony took place on Saturday, February 1, 2025, at the Madrigrano Conference Center on the Kenosha Campus. More than 120 guests celebrated with 40 scholarship recipients.
- **Total contributed dollars** secured in support of Gateway students, the college and the foundation as of February 28, 2025: \$676,975 from 344 donors.
